

My Experience Learning English in the U.S.A. by Soomin Hwang

I arrived at Palm Beach International Airport in October 2024. I still remember the intense heat and humidity that hit me the moment I stepped outside the gate. On the way to my new home, I was amazed by the palm trees and the stunning sunset sky. I was thrilled to be in the U.S. - a completely different world from South Korea.

But that excitement soon turned into fear and loneliness. I couldn't speak English fluently, and I spend most days at home. Watching the world through two "windows": the backyard window and my smartphone screen. I felt lost - I didn't know where to go, what to do, or who to talk to. Anxiety kept me awake at night; even though I went to bed at 11 p.m., I couldn't fall asleep until 6 a.m.

One night, I searched for nearby libraries and that's how I found the Gardens Public Library. The next day I gathered my courage and nervously stepped inside. I even memorized a script to talk to the librarian. But the librarian warmly welcomed me and introduced two amazing programs: *English Exchange* and *Tutoring*. Now, I regularly attend both.

Through English Exchange, I've met friends from all over the world and shared ideas across cultures. I'll never forget when they wrote me a birthday card filled with kind messages. It was deeply touching.

In tutoring, I found more than just a teacher. My tutor sends me helpful materials and encourages me to keep going. She's even helps me adjust to life in the U.S. She's invited me to activities like board games, book clubs, and swimming classes. Thanks to her, I've not only improved my language skills but also started to feel like I belong here.

Thanks to the library, I didn't just connect to the U.S. through a screen, I connected through people, kindness, and shared moments. For me, the Gardens Library is the true window that opened up my new life.


Change a Life:

An ESL Tutor's Story, by Nancy Copelan:

I have been an Adult Literacy tutor since 2018. During this time, I have worked with a number of students. My current student and I have been together since 2019. She and I meet weekly for 1.5 hours, initially in a library study room, now on Zoom. It is a very special time for both of us.

Along with guiding my student to improve her language skills, we have developed an incredible friendship. She fills a space for me, as my family lives out of town. She is from Spain and far from her parents and siblings as well. She has a beautiful family of her own and is an amazing mother and wife. I have seen an enormous improvement in her mastering of the English language. On a recent trip back to Spain, she was asked a question by an American tourist and surprised herself and her friends as to how well she responded in English.

I can only say that this experience has enhanced my life, increased my recipe file and given me enormous pleasure. Our goal is to match a tutor with each enrolled applicant. We encourage everyone to reach out to family and friends who may have an interest. There is no experience needed. Training and resources are provided through the program.


